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NOTES TO PARTICIPANTS & AUDIENCE:

1. All festival venues are scent-free in respect to those with allergies and sensitivities - please do not wear perfumes or colognes.
2. Participants, Teachers and Accompanists are asked to observe Canadian copyright Laws - use of unauthorized material may lead to disqualification.
3. Please remain seated or wait outside the performance areas during performances and adjudications.
4. Please refrain from conversation during performances and adjudication times.
5. Competitors, please notify the secretary's desk before the competition if unable to perform.
6. A solo participant must enter two classes per discipline to be eligible for an award.
7. The choice of scholarship winners is the sole responsibility of the adjudicators.
8. A cross section of performers will be selected by the adjudicators and the committee to perform at the final concert.
9. The festival president and executive members constitute a protest committee should need arise. All protests must be submitted in writing to a committee member and in no case is the adjudicator to be approached.

Andrea Hedlund has been an enthusiastic member of the Regina music community for the last several decades. Andrea began performing with the Regina Symphony Orchestra in 2004, where she also developed several successful RSO outreach programs. Andrea has been teaching violin at the Regina Conservatory of Performing Arts since 2005, where she currently manages a busy studio, teaching students of all levels. She enjoys providing lessons for the community that fostered her own early love of music.


Andrea completed a Bachelor of Music in Violin Performance under Dr. Howard Leyton-Brown (2007). Her teaching style has been most influenced by Leyton-Brown and her studies with

renowned Suzuki pedagogue Helen Brunner. In her studio, Andrea teaches various styles of music with a foundation in classical technique. This approach led her to co-create Viva Violins – a summer camp for young violinists. In her teaching, Andrea encourages musical excellence, creativity, collaboration and community engagement with a focus on individual wellbeing.



Andrea enjoys exploring her creativity through writing music and collaborating with other artists in the community. This has led her to work with artists such as Darryl Kissick, Wolf Willow, Riva Farrell-Racette, Son Howler, Dagan Harding Band, Scott Pettigrew, Snake River, Julia McDougall, Ryan Hicks, Mike Edel, JP Hoe, and Scott Richmond. Andrea was also a member of the AMMA string quartet – an all-female group that presented classical repertoire.

Andrea's investment in the wellbeing of her students has led her to recent studies in psychology. She holds a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology with High Honours (2025), and she is currently assisting with several research projects at the University of Regina aimed at improving mental health support for individuals with chronic illnesses and other challenges. As a music educator, Andrea believes that students learn best when their emotional wellbeing is supported, allowing for lasting musical growth.






